




These Lenten Nails will be available on Ash Wednesday and the first Sunday of Lent on a table in the back vestibule of the Church.

The season of Lent begins on Wednesday. If you are like most Christians you are already asking yourself "What am I going do or give up for lent?"

The Church asks us to do three things—Pray, Fast and Give Alms. To Pray means to raise our minds and hearts to God. It means to raise our relationship with God to another level.

If you do pray everyday then maybe you can pray with more intensity. If you don't pray everyday maybe it's because you have become obsessed with the ordinary things of the day. You are so busy you can't find time to pray or maybe you just don't think of it. "Why not find the time?" The simple answer is "make the time".

Ask yourself "What is one the thing I can do to improve my life of prayer". Keep it simple! Here are some suggestions:

- Pray the Rosary each day. It only takes about 15-20 minutes. Don't know how? Download the app "Laudate" on your iPhone or tablet. It will show you how and you can say the Rosary any time and much more.
- Say the Jesus prayer: "Lord Jesus Christ, son of the Living God, have mercy on me a sinner".
- Meditate for a time and just say, "Here I am Lord" and listen quietly. for about 1/2 hour.
- Attend daily Mass if possible or maybe once a week.
- Come back to Sunday Mass
- Go to Confession

It's like exercise, the more you practice the easier it gets and after a while it gets to be a routine.

**EVANGELIO SEGÚN SAN LUCAS 6, 39-45** 

En aquel tempo, Jesús propuso a sus discípulos este ejemplo: Puede acaso un ciego guiar a otro ciego? No caerán lo dos en un hoyo? El discípulo no es superior a su maestro; pero cuando termine su aprendizaje, será como su maestro. Por qué ves la paja en el ojo de tu hermano y no la viga que llevas en el tuyo? Cómo te atreves a decirle a tu hermano: Déjame quitarte la apaja que llevas en el oyo, si no adviertas la viga que llevas en el tuyo? Hipócrita! Saca primero la viga que llevas en tu ovo y entonces podrás ver, para sacar la apaja del ojo de tu hermano. No hay árbol bueno que produzca frutos malos, ni árbol malo que produzca frutos buenos. Cada árbol se conoce por sus frutos. No se recogen higos de las zarzas, ni se cortan uvas de los espinos. El hombre bueno dise cosas buenas, porque el bien está en su corazón, y el hombre malo dise cosas malas, porque el mal está en su corazón, pues la boca habla de lo que está lleno el cofrazón.




Los letrados, intérpretes de la ley, con los que Jesús disiente por su afán esmerado por hacer cumplir

Jesús sabia que eso era muy normal entre los personajes más prominentes de su época, tanto a nível politico como a nível social y religioso. Y no queria que sus discípulos siguieran ese caminho de falsedad. El Evangelio se vive, no se finge.

#### **EVANGELHO SEGUNDO SÃO LUCAS 6, 39-45**

Naquele tempo disse Jesus aos discípulos a seguinte parábola: "Poderá um cego guiar outro cego? Não cairão os dois nalguma cova? O discípulo não é superior ao mestre, mas todo o discípulo perfeito deverá ser como o seu mestre. Porque vês o argueiro que o teu irmão tem na vista e não reparas na trave que está na tua? Como podes dizer a teu irmão: Irmão, deixa-me tirar o argueiro que tens na vista, e tu não vês a trave que está na tua? Hipócrita, tira primeiro a trave da tua vista e então verás bem para tirar o argueiro da vista do teu irmão. Não há árvore boa que dê mau fruto, nem árvore má que dê bom fruto. Cada árvore conhece-se pelo seu fruto: não se colhem figos dos espinheiros, nem se apanham uvas das sarças. O homem bom, do bom tesouro do seu coração tira o bem; e o homem mau, da sua maldade tira o mal; pois a boca fala do que transborda do coração".



Certo dia os discípulos relatam a Jesus que os fariseus ficaram escandalizados com as suas palavras. Response Jesus: Deixai-os! São cegos e guias de cegos. Na passagem de hoje, os destinatários desta dramática advertência do Senhor são outros: já não são os fariseus, os adversários, os que se opõem a Cristo, mas os próprios discípulos. Também para eles existe o perigo de se comportarem como guias cegos. Nós, os cristãos, recebemos a luz do Evangelho e

caminhamos na luz. Jesus adverte os seus discípulos sobre um grave perigo: eles também correm o risco de perder a luz do Evangelho, de voltar novamente às trevas e deixarem-se guiar, como todos os outros, pelos falsos argumentos ditados pelos homens. Há falsos mestres cristãos que estão convencidos de que tudo o que dizem é sábio, certo, e que corresponde plenamente ao Evangelho. Parece mesmo que querem suplantar o Mestre. Por isso Jesus afirma outro provérbio: O discípulo não é superior ao mestre; mas todo discípulo bem preparado será como o seu mestre. Não podemos criar leis para impor às pessoas. Não podemos querer ser superiores ao Mestre. E muitas vezes chegamos ao ponto de querer julgar e condenar os outros, o que Jesus nunca fez. Jesus chama de hipócritas estes "juízes", este "mestres" cristãos, seguros de si mesmo e agarrados às próprias ideias.

#### Ben-Sirá 27, 4-7

Quando agitamos o crivo, só ficam impurezas: assim os defeitos do homem aparecem nas suas palavras. O forno prova os vasos do oleiro e o homem é posto à prova pelos seus pensamentos. O fruto da árvore manifesta a qualidade do campo: assim as palavras do homem revelam os seus sentimentos. Não elogies ninguém antes de ele falar, porque é assim que se experimentam os homens.

A primeira leitura deste domingo nos transmite um sábio ensinamento para desvendar o que há no coração de uma pessoa: é suficiente deixa-la falar e escutá-la com muita atenção.



Paulo, na Primeira Carta aos Coríntios, na leitura de hoje, resume tudo o que disse até este ponto. A morte, com todos os seus aliados – a dor, a doença, a fome, a violência, o ódio – não terá mais poder algum sobre o homem, porque a vitória de Cristo será total e definitiva.
