

As we move deeper into these cold winter months of January/February, I'm reminded of the warmth and beauty of the Advent/Christmas liturgical seasons during December past. Unfortunately I was somewhat absent from the life of the church because of back surgery and rehabilitation. But of course the Spirit of Corpus Christi always carries on, because of the profound dedication of our wonderful parish staff, and the love you as lay-persons in the pews have for this great community of Catholic faith!

Formally speaking, Christmas season ended on 8 January with the Feast of the Baptism of Jesus: not as a baby, but as a young man of 30 years; thus beginning His public ministry of three years. Informally, the spirit of Christmas continues through 2 February with the Feast of the Presentation of the Christ Child by Mary and Joseph, forty days after His birth. That's why you see in Church some of the remnants of green wreaths and red poinsettias continuing to beautify our sacred space. Nevertheless, be prepared for 14 February (Saint Valentine's Day for all you romantics!); which is also the beginning of the forty days of Lent on Ash Wednesday. Obviously, Easter Sunday will come early on 31 March (always determined by the first Sunday after the full moon that follows the Spring Equinox). It could be quite a chilly resurrection morning for Jesus to rise from dead!

Some of you have noticed the excavation site of work being done on our church property by Willis Avenue. This is for the foundation of the exquisite statue of Mother Mary and Child Jesus offered by our beloved deceased sister Irene Krause. As often happens with construction projects, there is a delay in creating the pedestal for the statue, so please be patient. Also, you can see in the adjacent page the mosaic image of the Eucharistic Christ in the monstrance, that was donated to adorn the "door to nowhere" on the facade of the church by Willis Avenue. Literally thousands of people walk/drive by Corpus Christi each day, and most will see this mosaic and say "what is

that?!". Hopefully they discover, "who that is!"; an image of the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, who is always in the Tabernacle less than ten feet from the mosaic design. I pray that the monstrance "sun" will guide all of God's people to the true "Son" in Holy Communion!



We could probably all think of people who opened doors for us in life. Perhaps at a crucial moment in our lives right direction. they pointed us in the That is how John Baptist is portrayed in the gospel reading. He had come to recognize Jesus as a very special revelation of God's love. He shared it with his own disciples, even though he knew that in doing so he was going to lose them to Jesus. He pointed two of his disciples in the direction of Jesus. He opened a door for them. Later, one of those disciples, Andrew, did for his brother, Simon, what John the Baptist had done for him. At any time in our adult life we can meet a John the Baptist who says to us, 'Look, there is the Lamb of God', and that can happen to us over and over again, right up to the very end of our lives. The Lord never ceases to call us through others into a deeper relationship with Himself. Indeed, there can come a time when the Lord asks any one of us to be a John the Baptist or an Andrew or an Eli for somebody else. He may call us to share our faith in some simple way, to open a door to the Lord for others. Our response to such a call can take many different forms. For Eli it took the form of helping the younger Samuel to find the right words for his prayer. For Andrew, it took the form of sharing a significant experience with his brother. The readings invite us to be open to the many ways the Lord can draw us to Himself, and also to the ways that He may be calling us to help Him in drawing others to Himself.

Español II DOMINGO DEL TIEMPO ORDINARIO



EVANGELIO DE SAN JUAN 1, 35-42

En aquel tiempo, estaba Juan el Bautista con dos de sus discípulos, y fijando los ojos en Jesús, que pasaba, dijo: "Este es el Cordero de Dios". Los dos discípulos, al oír estas palabras, siguieron a Jesús. Él se volvió hacia ellos, y viendo que lo seguían, les preguntó: "Qué buscan"? Ellos le contestaron. "Dónde vives, Rabi"? (Rabi significa "maestro"). Él les dijo: "Vengan a ver". Fueron, pues, vieron dónde vivía v se quedaron con él ese día. Eran como las cuatro de la tarde. Andrés, hermano de Simón Pedro, era uno de los dos que overon lo que Juan el Bautista decía y siguieron a Jesús. El primero a quien encontró Andrés, fue a su hermano Simón, y le dijo: "Hemos encontrado al Mesías" (que quiere decir el "Ungido"). Lo llevó a donde estaba Jesús y éste fijando en él la mirada, le dijo: "Tú eres Simón, hijo de Juan. Tú te llamarás Kefás" (que significa Pedro, es decir, "roca".



El evangelio de hoy nos presenta la forma en que Jesús acogió a sus primeros discípulos. No se hace por medio de una llamada concreta de Jesús, como sucederá después con Felipe, sino de otra forma distinta. Probablemente en este evangelio de Juan hay una intencionalidad manifiesta: el paso de los discípulos de Juan Bautista a Jesús. El Bautista no se encuentra desairado, porque en otro momento él

mismo dice: "es necesario que El crezca y que yo disminuya". (Juan 3, 30). Así, pues, una vez que Juan el Bautista ha cumplido la misión que le correspondía, llega el momento de seguir a Jesús, de vivir con él, de contemplar su morada. Donde vivía Jesús? No se nos dice en el relato, porque su intención es poner de manifestó que su modo de vida es lo que se describirá a lo largo del evangelio. Desde luego, aceptar a Jesús, su vida, su ideas y su experiencia de Dios, no puede dejarnos donde estábamos antes. Todo ha de cambiar. Seguiremos a Jesús y su evangelio, y volveremos a sentir la necesidad del perdón, de la gracia.



La lectura de Samuel nos relata la vocación profética de Samuel, el niño que la madre consagró a Yahvé como prenda por haberle concedido el don de la maternidad. Samuel, que sería el profeta que habría de conducir al pueblo hasta la llegada de David, vivía con el sacerdote Elí en el santuario donde estaba depositada el arca de la Alianza. Los hijos de Elí, no seguirán los pasos de su padre, no heredarán el carisma. Sería Samuel el llamado por Dios para ser su profeta; porque el profetismo no se hereda, ni es una institución que se aprenda, sino que hay de descubrirla, hay que escuchar la llamada de Dios.



Corinto era una ciudad famosa por su santuario a Afrodita, la diosa del amor, al que acudían gentes que llegaban a la ciudad para participaren en la prostitución sagrada. Esto, probablemente, lo escribe Pablo, porque algunos convertidos al cristianismo no veían inconveniente en participar en esos ritos sagrados de la sexualidad.

Português Domingo II do tempo comum



EVANGELHO DE SÃO JOÃO 1, 35-42

Naquele tempo, estava João Baptista com dois dos seus discípulos e, vendo Jesus que passava, disse: "Eis o Cordeiro de Deus". Os dois discípulos ouviram-no dizer aquelas palavras e seguiram Jesus. Entretanto, Jesus voltou-se; e, ao ver que o seguiam, disse-lhes: "Que procurais? Eles responderam: "Rabi - que quer dizer Mestre - *onde moras*"? Disse-lhes Jesus: "Vinde ver". Eles foram ver onde morava e ficaram com ele nesse dia. Era por volta das quatro horas da tarde. André, irmão de Simão Pedro, foi um dos que ouviram João e seguiram Jesus. Foi procurar primeiro seu irmão Simão e disse-lhe: "Encontramos o Messias" – que quer dizer Cristo -, e levou-o a Jesus. Fitando os olhos nele, Jesus disselhe: "Tu és Simão, filho de João. Chamar-te-ás Cefas - que quer dizer Pedro".



O Evangelho deste domingo narra o chamamento dos primeiros três apóstolos: André, um outro discípulo sem nome, e Simão Pedro. Esse início do Evangelho de João a principal preocupação do autor é apresentar a figura de Jesus. João Baptista tem um lugar especial neste contexto de apresentação de Jesus. Ele é o percussor do Messias, aquele que Deus enviou para preparar os homens para acolherem Jesus. João sabe que a sua missão não é congregar à sua volta um grupo de adeptos mas preparar o coração dos homens para acolher Jesus. A expressão eis o cordeiro de Deus, usada por João para

apresentar Jesus, fará, provavelmente, referência ao cordeiro pascal, símbolo da libertação oferecida por Deus ao seu Povo, prisioneiro no Egipto. O sangue do cordeiro pascal, derramado nas ombreiras das portas, salvou os israelitas da morte. Esta expressão define Jesus como o enviado de Deus, que vem inaugurar a nova Páscoa e realizar a libertação definitiva dos homens. Ou também a expressão Cordeiro de Deus, pode evocar o servo fiel ao Senhor de quem nos fala o livro de Isaías, servo que é comparado a um cordeiro manso que e deixa conduzir à morte sem oferecer resistência. Ambas estas referências se podem aplicar a Jesus. Depois da declaração de João, os discípulos reconhecem em Jesus esse Messias. As palavras dirigidas por Jesus aos dois discípulos que o seguem: O que procurais? São, segundo o Evangelho de João, as primeiras que ele pronuncia. Claramente são dirigidas a todo o discípulo que inicia o seu caminho espiritual, depois de alguém lhe ter indicado o novo Mestre. A pergunta de Jesus àqueles dois discípulos que ousaram ir atrás dele, é dirigida a cada um de nós. A todos nós que nos sentimos insatisfeitos, Jesus é a fonte que pode saciar a nossa sede de Vida.



A primeira leitura traz-nos a história do chamamento do profeta Samuel. Diz-nos que o chamamento é sempre uma iniciativa de Deus. É ele que vem ao encontro do homem, chama-o pelo nome, desafia-o a ser sinal e testemunho do projeto de Deus no mundo. A resposta do jovem Samuel pode constituir um exemplo da nossa resposta ao Deus que chama.
