Over the years the children in the Religious Education Program enjoyed re-enacting the Christmas Gospel in different ways.





Gospel: Luke 21:5-11

"He said to them, "Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven.

At the end of the liturgical year we meet some of the most symbol-laden literature in the Bible, about the end of the world. Jesus cautions us by saying, "Take care not to be misled." The liturgy provides the way to interpret these passages, bidding us take responsibility for our actions, examine where we are spiritually, and face our mortality. It tells us that the end of history will open up a new beginning for mankind.

All human efforts to dominate others will come to a sorry end. Nebuchadnezzar dreamed of a statue with its four principal sections represented the four great kingdoms that successively oppressed Israel: the Babylonians, Medes, Persians and Greeks. No matter how colossal they were, and how seemingly invincible, these kingdoms collapsed. The message was that for all their power and prestige, material wealth and political clout, none of these proud empires could last forever. All that lasts is what God achieves in our lives. this will be the a "kingdom that shall never be destroyed." But we may have to pass through many difficulties before eventually all will be well, when the Son of Man comes in glory. Jesus foretold the destruction of the wonderful Temple in Jerusalem. Nobody could imagine the temple in Jerusalem being destroyed. But even the finest buildings only last so long. We are meant not to get too attached to structures that do not last. Instead, we are to rely on Jesus, who is greater than the Temple. When all else fails and disappears, He endures, and through our relationship with Him we too will last.

Español II domingo de adviento



EVANGELIO DE SAN MARCOS 1, 1-8

Este es el principio del Evangelio de Jesucristo, Hijo de Dios. En el libro del profeta Isaías está escrito: "He aquí que yo envío a mi mensajero delante de ti, a preparar tu camino. Voz del que clama en el desierto: Preparen el camino del Señor, enderecen sus senderos. En cumplimiento de esto, apareció en el desierto Juan Bautista predicando un bautismo arrepentimiento, para el perdón de los pecados. A él acudían de toda la comarca de Judea y muchos habitantes de Jerusalén; reconocían sus pecados y él los bautizaba en el Jordán. Juan usaba un vestido de pelo de camello, ceñido con un cinturón de cuero y se alimentaba de saltamontes y miel silvestre. Proclamaba: Ya viene detrás de mí uno que es más poderoso que yo, uno ante quien no merezco ni siquiera inclinarme para desatarle la correa de sus sandalias. Yo los he bautizado a ustedes con agua, pero él los bautizará con el Espíritu Santo".



El domingo anterior, el primero del Adviento, se nos invitó a estar alerta ante la venida del Señor, en continua vigilancia. Hoy, en el segundo domingo de Adviento, se nos pide que seamos pacientes y nos preparemos bien para dicha venida. San Marcos comienza su Evangelio hablándonos del anuncio de San Juan Bautista. Él es el mensajero del que nos

habló el profeta Isaías, el que proclama en el desierto la venida del Salvador, y el que ayuda al pueblo a prepararse para tal acontecimiento. Así es, San Juan Bautista ofrece al pueblo un purificador bautismo de arrepentimiento y conversión interior para que todos los que lo deseen puedan vivir el Reino de Dios. El Adviento no es tiempo de preparar una fiesta pagana, sin la presencia de Dios, pero al contrario, es tiempo de preparación para celebrar el nacimiento del Señor. El Adviento es la ocasión propicia para examinar nuestras deficiencias y aportarlas como material de relleno que sirvan para allanar el camino por el que llega el Señor. Lo que la Iglesia nos pide es que nos acerquemos a la celebración de Navidad con una preparación esmerada que nos haga gozar y vivir el gran misterio de la filiación divina en carne humana. Cambiar nuestros deseos y aspiraciones no significa renuncia a todo nuestro vivir, sino ordenar, proyectar y ejecutar nuestros deseos conforme a esa gran aportación que es la llegada de quien es más fuerte que nosotros.

Consuelen, consuelen a mi pueblo, dice tu Dios, hablen al corazón de Jerusalén (1s 40,1)




EVANGELHO DE SÃO MARCOS 1, 1-8

Início do Evangelho de Jesus Cristo, Filho de Deus. Está escrito no profeta Isaías: Vou enviar à tua frente o meu mensageiro, que preparará o teu caminho. Uma voz clama no deserto: Preparai o caminho do Senhor, endireitai as suas veredas. Apareceu João Baptista no deserto, a proclamar um baptismo de penitência para remissão dos pecados. Acorria a ele toda a gente da região da Judeia e todos os habitantes de Jerusalém e eram baptizados por ele no rio Jordão, confessando os seus pecados. João vestia-se de pêlos de camelo, com um cinto de cabedal em volta dos rins, e alimentava-se de gafanhotos e mel silvestre. E, na sua pregação dizia: "Vai chegar depois de mim quem é mais forte do que eu, diante do qual eu não sou digno de me inclinar para desatar as correias das suas sandálias. Eu baptizo-vos na água, mas ele baptizar-vos-á no Espírito Santo".



O Evangelho Segundo Marcos parece ter sido o primeiro dos Evangelhos a ser redigido, certamente antes do ano 70. Trata-se de uma obra destinada a uma comunidade maioritariamente composta por cristãos vindos diretamente do paganismo, provavelmente a comunidade cristã de Roma. Muitos da comunidade cristã de Roma viam a sua fé abalada por causa da perseguição. Marcos, que conhecia bem esta realidade, queria ajudar os seus

irmãos na fé. A liturgia deste segundo domingo do Advento constitui um veemente apelo à conversão. Em toda a região da Judeia, o povo alimentava grande esperanças no Messias que devia chegar. Ele, dizia-se, revolucionará a situação social: tirará os ricos dos seus tronos, destruirá os maus e tornará felizes os pobres, e dará início a um mundo e a uma humanidade completamente novos. O corpo central deste Evangelho apresenta-nos a missão de João Baptista, a sua pregação, a reação dos ouvintes e o testemunho de João sobre Jesus. A missão de João é ser o mensageiro que prepara o caminho para o Messias, Filho de Deus. Ele aparece no deserto a proclamar um baptismo de penitência para remissão dos pecados. Ele convida os israelitas a converteremse para permitir que o Messias se manifeste e que surja um novo mundo.



tinha Jerusalém sido destruída pelo rei Nabucodonosor e os israelitas tinham conduzidos como escravos para a Babilónia. Depois de uns quarenta anos, eis que surge entre eles um profeta que julga estar próximo o momento de despertar nos exilados a esperança de que a escravidão está terminada e que está iminente o regresso à terra dos seus pais. O trecho da primeira leitura começa com o anúncio da alegria que o Senhor promete pela boca do profeta: "Consolai, consolai o meu povo...Falai ao coração de Jerusalém e dizei-lhe em alta voz que terminaram os seus trabalhos...porque recebeu da mão do Senhor duplo castigo por todos os seus pecados". O profeta anuncia aquele que virá pregar ao povo que preparem no deserto o caminho do Senhor!
