

We collected 64 pints of blood and blood products which will be used to help cancer patients, burn and accident victims, cardiac and emergency surgery patients, sickle

cell anemia patients & mothers and babies post-delivery when needed. This exceeded our goal of 54 pints. Most appreciated are those 23 donors who walked in without having registered prior to the drive. You really helped push us over our goal!!

There is no substitute for human blood; it can't be artificially made. Patients requiring a blood transfusion rely solely on the kindness and generosity of volunteer donors to provide them with this life-saving gift. In the United States, more than 15 million pints are transfused each year. One pint of blood can save 3 lives. Due to your generosity in rolling up your sleeves, your donations helped 192 people!!!! It is deeply gratifying to see that we, members of Corpus Christi, The Body and Blood of Christ, responded to this vital need and embodied our parish motto, **You Together are My Body**.

These are days of Fast and Abstinence from meat.


There is a limit to one full meal on these days for all between the ages of 18 and 59 inclusive. **Days of Abstinence:** (All Fridays in Lent)

The church is a human institution and is in need of ongoing reform. The church exists to serve the purposes of God. Because the church is composed of human beings, it can also serve as a block to God's purposes. The church is called to reveal the powerful and life-giving presence of Christ. In the 2nd Reading, Paul sets God's wisdom and power over human wisdom and power. The church can sometimes substitute God's wisdom and power with human wisdom and power. In the gospel Jesus wanted to purify the temple, the risen Lord is constantly working to purify the church. All of us need to be open to his purifying presence. Those in leadership in the church have a special responsibility to listen to what the Spirit is saying to the church. We are all the church, and all have our part to play in ensuring that the church is what the Lord intends it to be. Lent in particular is a time when we try to listen to what the Spirit may be saying to us about our lives; it is a time when as individuals and as a community we are called to allow the Spirit to renew our lives so that we conform more fully to the image and likeness of Christ.

The fiery Jesus of the gospel reading, who is passionate about what God, remains alive and active at the heart of the church today. In the light of the gospel reading we might ask ourselves in what ways we have allowed the values of the market place to override the values of the gospel in our own lives, in the life of our society, in the life of our church.

EVANGELIO DE SAN JUAN 3, 14-21

En aquel tiempo, Jesús dijo a Nicodemo: "Así como levantó Moisés la serpiente en el desierto, así tiene que ser levantado el Hijo del hombre, para que todo el que crea en él tenga vida eterna. Porque tanto amó Dios al mundo que le entregó su Hijo único, para que todo el que crea en él no perezca, sino que tenga vida eterna. Porque Dios no envió a su Hijo para condenar al mundo, sino para que el mundo se salvara por él. El que cree en él no será condenado; pero el que no cree va está condenado, por no haber creído en el Hijo único de Dios. La causa de la condenación es ésta: habiendo venido la luz a mundo los hombres prefirieron las tinieblas a la luz, porque sus obras eran malas. Todo aquel que hace el mal, aborrece la luz y no se acerca a ella, para que sus obras no se descubran. En cambio, el que obra el bien conforme a la verdad, se acerca a la luz, para que se vea que sus obras están hechas según Dios".



La liturgia del cuarto Domingo de Cuaresma, nos garantiza que Dios nos ofrece, de forma totalmente gratuita e incondicional, la vida eterna. En el Evangelio, Juan nos recuerda que Dios nos amó de tal forma, que envió a su Hijo único a nuestro encuentro para ofrecernos la vida eterna. Estamos invitados a Mirar a Jesús, a aprender con él la lección del amor total, a recorrer con él el camino de la entrega y e la donación de la vida. Ese es el camino de la salvación, de la vida plena y definitiva.

El texto del Evangelio es la conversación entre Jesús y Nicodemo, un jefe de los judíos. Nicodemo fue a visitar Jesús de noche, lo que parece indicar que no quería comprometer y arriesgar la posición destacada de la que gozaba en la estructura religiosa judía. Miembro del Sanedrín, Nicodemo aparecerá más tarde, defendiendo a Jesús, delante de los jefes de los fariseos. También estará presente en el momento en que Jesús fue bajado de la cruz y colocado en el sepulcro. En el texto que se nos propone la lectura, Jesús comienza a explicar a Nicodemo que el mesías tiene que ser "elevado", lo mismo que Moisés "elevó" la serpiente en el desierto. La referencia evoca el episodio de la marcha por el desierto cuando los hebreos, mordidos por las serpientes, miraban una serpiente de bronce levantada en el estandarte por Moisés y se curaban. La imagen de la elevación de Jesús se refiere, naturalmente, a la cruz, paso necesario para llegar a la exaltación, a la vida definitiva. Es ahí donde Jesús manifiesta su amor y muestra a los hombres el camino que ellos deben recorrer para alcanzar la salvación, la vida plena.



La primera lectura nos dice que, cuando el hombre prescinde de Dios y escoge caminos de egoísmo y de autosuficiencia, está construyendo un futuro marcado por horizontes de dolor y de muerte.



La segunda lectura enseña que Dios ama al hombre con un amor total; ese amor es el que levanta al hombre de su condición de finitud y que le ofrece un mundo nuevo de vida plena y de felicidad sin fin que está en el horizonte final de nuestra existencia.

Português domingo iv da quaresma



EVANGELHO DE SÃO JOÃO 3, 14-21

Naquele tempo, disse Jesus a Nicodemos: "Assim como Moisés elevou a serpente no deserto também o Filho do homem será elevado, para que todo aquele que acredita tenha nele a vida eterna. Deus amou tanto o mundo que entregou o seu Filho Unigénito, para que todo o homem que acredita nele não pereça, mas tenha a vida eterna. Porque Deus não enviou o Filho ao mundo para condenar o mundo, mas para que o mundo seja salvo por ele. Quem acredita nele não é condenado, mas quem não acredita já está condenado, porque não acreditou no nome do Filho Unigénito de Deus. E a causa da condenação é esta: a Luz veio ao mundo e os homens amaram mais as trevas do que a Luz, porque eram más as suas obras. Todo aquele que pratica más acções odeia a luz e não se aproxima dela para que as suas obras não sejam denunciadas. Mas quem pratica a verdade aproxima-se da luz, para que as suas obras sejam manifestas pois são feitas em Deus".



O evangelho expressa a lembrança do Êxodo. Deus tinha castigado a rebeldia do povo com a praga das serpentes. Para os livrar da praga, Moisés levantou à vista dos israelitas uma serpente de bronze numa haste. Os que levantaram com fé os olhos para este sinal ficaram curados. Os rabinos explicavam esse acontecimento dizendo que no deserto os israelitas não eram curados por voltarem os olhos para a serpente, mas porque elevavam o seu coração a Deus. Era o Senhor que salvava, e não o objeto de bronze. Jesus refere-se a este episódio e interpreta-o como um símbolo de quanto está para lhe acontecer a ele. Também ele será levantado na cruz e todos os que o comtemplarem terão a vida salva.



A primeira leitura nos mostra como Israel se afastou de Deus. Na derrota e no exílio, porém, entenderam que sua desgraça era um sinal de seu afastamento de Deus. Os homens dos tempos antigos estavam convencidos de que Deus concedia as suas bênçãos (saúde, bem-estar, riqueza, boas colheitas, família numerosa) àqueles que observassem 05 mandamentos, e que mandava desgraças a quem lhe desobedecesse. Também na Bíblia se encontra esta ideia de uma retribuição automática das accões. A lógica do autor do Livro das Crónicas surpreendenos. Esta maneira de entender o relacionamento com Deus é muito primitiva e levanta grandes dificuldades. Como explicar, por exemplo, os sofrimentos e as desgraças dos justos, por um lado e, por outro, a prosperidade dos malvados?



A segunda leitura diz-nos que, apesar da nossa condição de fragilidade e de pecado, Deus nos ofereceu, em Cristo a Vida e a salvação. Não o fez em resultado dos nossos merecimentos; foi uma oferta totalmente gratuita, que resulta do amor que nos tem.
