Holy Mass Attendance Obligations



The general dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation in the Diocese of Rockville Centre will end on the eve of the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary: August 14, 2021. This means that the faithful are required to attend Sunday and Holy Days of Obligation Masses beginning on August 14, 2021. This obligation does not apply to those who are ill, those who are confined to their home, a hospital, or nursing facility, or those with serious underlying health conditions. Consult your local pastor if you have questions about the obligation to attend Mass.

Although the “obligation” to keep the Lord’s Day holy and participate in the Holy Mass is a most serious commandment, it is better understood as a profound act of love. The greatest love the world will ever know is the sacrifice of Jesus Christ on the cross for our salvation. Every Mass is a chance for us to be a part of that Divine love here on earth and to prepare for eternal life with God in Heaven. We should hunger for our Lord’s presence in the Eucharist / Holy Communion and desire to be a part of the Mass every Sunday. Keep watch for announcements from your parish on special prayer opportunities leading to Mary’s Feast Day on August 15.

What is World Day for Grandparents & the Elderly?

The biblical figures of Abraham and Sarah, Moses, Elizabeth and Zechariah, Simeon, and Anna each remind us, in the words of St. John Paul II, that "...at every stage of life the Lord can ask each of us to contribute what talents we have. The service of the gospel has nothing to do with age!" (*St. John Paul II, "Letter of His Holiness Pope John Paul II to the Elderly" 1999*)

Pope Francis, in expanding upon the groundwork of his predecessors, has proclaimed the fourth Sunday of July as **World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly** to acknowledge and celebrate the indispensable treasure of those "rich in years." While there are separate days of secular recognition for both grandparents and the elderly in the autumn, this combined day of honor, during the more relaxed days of summer and inserted into the liturgical calendar, offers a grand opportunity to emphasize the holy bonds we share in our families and our communities. The temporal proximity to the Feast of Saints Joachim and Anne, the grandparents of Jesus, is intended to reinforce the vital role of family in honoring the gifts of age.

In preparing for this day, we can contemplate the profound beauty of our Catholic Faith and traditions, the giving and receiving of love through our generational ties, and the perpetual communion we share with our forebearers. We pray this website will be the beginning of a spiritual journey that strengthens faith, family, and community: nurturing intergenerational bonds and helping us to "love the Lord with all your heart and your neighbor as yourself" (Lk 11:25-27) which is the key to our ultimate goal of sharing in God's eternal life.

"Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks, and distributed them to those who were reclining; about five thousand in number" The multiplication account has more to do with what Jesus was saying about the future than about feeding a hungry crowd. The abundance is a sign of the resurrected life and points to a time of fulfillment when God's plan for redemption is finally realized. The bread grain is specified as barley, the grain used by the poor; in the messianic reign the poor will share in God's abundance. Jesus supersedes both the apostles' and the crowd's expectations: with little he feeds many...Jesus is the sign of God's lavish presence and love. In the Manual for the Society we read: For St. Vincent and Frederic Osanam, there is only one love. The love of God and the love of the neighbor are one and the same love. It is our love in response to God's love for us. Since the loving God cannot be seen but must be experienced through loving people, it follows that one who sees others without loving cannot love or even know God. For Vincent and Frederic, as for Jesus, love is neither sentiment, nor affection, nor theory, but a practical willing of another's best interests and a consequent striving to advance those interests. Vincentians are about loving. Love is a verb, not a noun. Vincentians are concerned with the practice and exercise of the virtue of charity...loving God above all things and our neighbor as ourselves for the love of God. XVII DOMINGO DEL TIEMPO ORDINARIO



Evangelio Según San Juan 6, 1-15

En aquel tiempo, Jesús se fue a la otra orilla del mar de Galilea o lago de Tiberíades. Lo seguía mucha gente, porque habían visto las señales milagrosas que hacía curando a los enfermos. Jesús subió al monte y se sentó allí con sus discípulos. Estaba cerca la Pascua, festividad de los judíos. Viendo Jesús que mucha gente lo seguía, le dijo a Felipe: “Cómo compraremos pan para que coman éstos”? Le hizo esta pregunta para ponerlo a prueba, pues él sabía lo que iba a hacer. Felipe le respondió: “Ni doscientos denarios bastarían para que cada uno le tocara un pedazo de pan”. Otro de sus discípulos, Andrés, el hermano de Simón Pedro, le dijo: “Aquí hay un muchacho que trae cinco panes de cebada y dos pescados. Pero qué es eso para tanta gente”? Jesús le respondió: “Diganle a la gente que se siente”. En aquel lugar había mucha hierba. Todos, pues, se sentaron ahí; y tan sólo los hombres eran unos cinco mil. Enseguida tomó Jesús los panes, y después de dar gracias a Dios, se los fue repartiendo a los que habían sentado a comer. Igualmente les fue dando de los pescados todo lo que quisieron. Después de que todos se saciaron, dijo a sus discípulos: “Recojan los pedazos sobrantes para que no se desperdicien”. Los recogieron y con los pedazos que sobraron de los cinco panes llenaron doce canastos. Entonces la gente, al ver la señal milagrosa que Jesús había hecho, decía: “Este es, en verdad, el profeta que había de venir al mundo”. Pero Jesús, sabiendo que iban a llevárselo para proclamarlo rey, se retiró de nuevo a la montaña, él solo.



“Vino entonces un hombre de Baal-salisa, el cual trajo al varón de Dios panes de primicias, veinte panes de cebada, y trigo nuevo en su espiga. Y él dijo: Da a la gente para que coma.”

2 Reyes 4:42

La multiplicación de los panes es uno de los más grandes milagros realizados por Jesús. Como se relata por los evangelistas, la Iglesia primitiva le concedió una gran importancia a esto. El milagro de Jesús parece ser una repetición del milagro del profeta Eliseo que se menciona en la primera lectura de este domingo, pero es mucho más que eso. En ese episodio, Eliseo alimentó aproximadamente a cien personas con veinte panes de cebada; y en el Evangelio, Jesús alimenta a una multitud de cinco mil personas. El milagro del profeta Eliseo es una profecía de lo que haría Jesús. El milagro realizado por Jesús ya muestraba que había comenzado en la tierra la nueva humanidad, en la cual toda la gente podría satisfacer sus necesidades básicas. Es una alusión al Reino de Dios. Es una alusión de la Eucaristía, una comida de amor y unidad en la cual el Pueblo de Dios es alimentado milagrosamente de un pan y un cálice.



Que vivan con toda humildad y mansedumbre, con paciencia, soportándose unos a otros en amor, ³ haced todo lo posible para mantener la unidad del Espíritu a través del vínculo de la paz.
Efesios 4:2-3

La segunda lectura es de la carta de San Pablo a los efesios. El trata de fortalecer la fe y los fundamentos de los creyentes a quienes se dirige, mientras sufre por causa de la verdad.

DOMINGO XVII DO TEMPO COMUM



Evangelho Segundo S. João 6, 1-15


Naquele tempo, Jesus partiu para o outro lado do mar da Galileia, ou de Tiberíades. Seguia-o numerosa multidão por ver os milagres que ele realizava nos doentes. Jesus subiu a um monte e sentou-se aí com os seus discípulos. Estava próxima a Páscoa, a festa dos judeus. Erguendo os olhos e vendo que uma grande multidão vinha ao seu encontro, Jesus disse a Filipe: “*Onde havemos de comprar pão para lhes dar de comer?*” Dizia isto para o experimentar, pois ele bem sabia o que ia fazer. Respondeu-lhe Filipe: “*Duzentos denários de pão não chegam para dar um bocadinho a cada um.*” Disse-lhe um dos discípulos, André, irmão de Simão Pedro: “*Está aqui um rapazito que tem cinco pães de cevada e dois peixes. Mas que é isso para tanta gente?*” Jesus respondeu: “*Mandai-os sentar.*” Havia muita erva naquele lugar e os homens sentaram-se em número de uns cinco mil. Então, Jesus tomou os pães, deu graças e distribuiu-os aos que estavam sentados, fazendo o mesmo com os peixes; e comeram quantos quiseram. Quando ficaram saciados, Jesus disse aos discípulos: “*Recolhei os bocados que sobraram, para que nada se perca.*” Recolheram-nos e encheram doze cestos com os bocados dos cinco pães de cevada que sobraram aos que tinham comido. Quando viram o milagre que Jesus fizera, aqueles homens começaram a dizer: “*Este é, na verdade, o Profeta que estava para vir ao mundo.*” Mas Jesus, sabendo que viriam buscá-lo para o fazerem rei, retirou-se novamente, sozinho, para o monte.

II Reis 4, 42-44

Naqueles dias, veio um homem da povoação de Baal-Salisa e trouxe a Eliseu, o homem de Deus, pão feito com os primeiros frutos da colheita. Eram vinte pães de cevada e trigo novo no seu alforge. Eliseu disse: «Dá-os a comer a essa gente». O servo respondeu: «Como posso com isto dar de comer a cem pessoas?». Eliseu insistiu: «Dá-os a comer a essa gente, porque assim fala o Senhor: 'Comerão e ainda há-de sobrar». Deu-lhes e eles comeram, e ainda sobrou, segundo a palavra do Senhor.

A primeira leitura deste domingo, do Segundo Livro dos Reis, é um anúncio ou uma profecia daquilo que Jesus iria fazer um dia: O milagre da multiplicação dos pães e dos peixes.

Há um só Senhor, uma só fé, um só batismo, um só Deus e Pai de todos, que reina sobre todos, age por meio de todos e permanece em todos.

Na Segunda Leitura desse domingo, S. Paulo escreve uma carta para a comunidade cristã de Éfeso. Paulo da prisão escreve uma carta maravilhosa em que aprofunda de maneira particular o mistério de Cristo e a vida vivida segundo esse mistério. Todas as leituras deste domingo nos falam da generosidade que devemos ter com as pessoas. Afinal temos um só Deus!
