

Proposal 1: A Wolf in Sheep's Clothing

A statement of the Catholic Bishops of New York State

On November 5, faithful citizens throughout the nation will have the opportunity once again to exercise their sacred right to vote. Pope Francis has reminded us that as thoughtful Catholics, we must participate in the public square for the sake of the common good. Every Catholic is called to do the work of properly informing his or her conscience and voting for candidates and policies that will best advance the natural law, the protection of human rights, the dignity of the human person, the sacredness of all life, and the teachings of Christ and His Church. It is a presidential election year, and there are important votes to be cast for Congress and the state Legislature as well. Importantly, in New York, like several other states, there is also a critical referendum on the ballot.

Educating oneself will be especially important in the case of Proposal 1, sometimes referred to as the "Equal Rights Amendment." The title suggests a noble cause, as all children of God should be treated equally under the law. However, this proposed amendment to the state Constitution is broadly written and could have dangerous consequences if enacted, which is why we oppose it and urge you to vote no. The measure would, effectively, permanently legalize abortion without restriction and up until the moment of birth in New York. Aside from being redundant in a state that already has stripped away all abortion limitations, the amendment would render impossible any change to the law if the hearts and minds of New Yorkers were ever to shift toward protecting the child in the womb.

The amendment's sweeping language and inclusion of "age" as a protected class could also lead to parents' rights being stripped away. Courts could decide that parents have no authority over their minor children on important matters and permit children to make destructive and permanent decisions on their own which they could well live to regret, including but not limited to so-called "gender affirming" treatments and surgeries. The relationship between parents and their children is sacred. Parents must be able to support and guide their children in accord with the natural law, without interference from the government or courts, which would be reaching beyond their competency.

Proposal 1 is a wolf in sheep's clothing that could lead to darkness for many New York families. This amendment disregards the lives of unborn and struggling children in the name of political agendas. It could have dangerous consequences for these children and their parents. As they look to make their voices heard in the public square, faithful Catholics should consider these consequences and vote no. Likewise, they should thoughtfully vote their informed conscience up and down the ballot so that we might usher in change for good.

We probably all find it easier telling people who they are than listening to people tell us who they really are. In particular, we can struggle to hear the story of someone's brokenness, especially if our picture of them has been one that doesn't allow for that. Peter wasn't able to hear Jesus talking about himself as a broken, failed, rejected Messiah. It was really only after the resurrection that Peter and the disciples were able to come to terms with such brokenness, such failure. It can be a struggle for us to accept failure and brokenness in others and also to accept our own brokenness. Jesus could accept his own failure, his own brokenness, because he trusted in God as one who would make him whole. Because he could accept his own failure, his own brokenness, he was at home with the failure and brokenness of others. The broken, the failures of this world, flocked to him, and in his presence they came alive. We will more easily accept our own brokenness and failures if we know in our heart of hearts that we too can approach the Lord as one who can make us whole. The Eucharist has been described as bread broken for a broken people. The Lord who was broken on the cross for us is present in the Eucharist as our Life-Giver. We approach the Lord in the Eucharist in our own brokenness asking to be made whole, and asking also for the grace to be able to sit with others in their brokenness.

EVANGELIO: SAN MARCOS 9, 30-37

En aquel tiempo, Jesús y sus discípulos atravesaban Galilea, pero el no quería que nadie lo supiera, porque iba enseñando a sus discípulos. Les decía: El Hijo del hombre va a ser entregado en manos de los hombres; le darán muerte, y tres días después de muerto, resucitará. Pero ellos no entendían aquellas palabras y tenían miedo de pedir explicaciones. Llegaron a Cafarnaun, y una vez en casa, les preguntó: De qué discutían por el camino? Pero ellos se quedaron callados, porque en el camino habían discutido sobre quién de ellos era el más importante. Entonces Jesús se sentó, llamó a los Doce v les dijo: Si alguno quiere ser el primero, que sea el último de todos y el servidor de todos. Después, tomando a un niño, lo puso en medio de ellos, lo abrazó y les dijo: El que me recibe e mi nombre a uno de estos niños, a mí me recibe. Y el que me reciba a mí, no me recibe a mí, sino a aquel que me ha enviado.



Jesús habla a sus discípulos y les confía el misterio de su Pasión y Muerte. Pero ellos no pueden entender todo eso. Les gustaba más el triunfo aparente y momentáneo de Jesús. Ya se veían ellos colocados en puestos de honor junto al que presidía el nuevo reino flanqueado por la Ley y los Profetas. Esta era la discusión que mantenían los discípulos de Jesús

mientras caminaban con él v no se atrevían a preguntarle qué era aquello del sufrimiento y del fracaso antes de la resurrección. A ellos lo que más les interesaba era saber quién sería el más importante en el futuro reino de Dios. En Cafarnaún, en la casa, Jesús tomó a un niño y lo puso ante ellos como símbolo de su impotencia. Acoger en nombre de Jesús a alguien como un niño es aceptar a los que no tienen poder, ni defensa, ni derechos; es saber oír a los que no tienen voz; son los pobres y despreciados de este mundo. La opción por los vulnerables (los pobres) es la verdadera clave de la moral evangélica. Ellos son los primeros en el Reino de Dios. Las guerras y las contiendas son el resultado de la codicia y ambición que nos impulsa a ser los primeros, a ocupar los primeros puestos, sin pensar que delante de Dios, los últimos serán los primeros y los primeros serán los últimos.



La primera lectura, del libro de la Sabiduría, se toma concretamente de un pasaje que pone de manifestó el racionamiento de los impíos, de los que están instalados en la sociedad religiosa y política y que no aceptan que un hombre justo, honrado, simplemente con el testigo de su vida, pueda ser una condenación de la ética, de la moral de los que controlan la sociedad. La lectura cristiana de este pasaje ha dado como resultado de la comparación con los textos del Siervo de Yahavé de Isaías y más concretamente se apunta a la inspiración que ha podido suponer para los cristianos sobre la Pasión del Señor.





DOMINGO XXV DO TEMPO COMUM



EVANGELHO: SÃO MARCOS 9, 30-37

Naquele tempo, Jesus e os seus discípulos caminhavam através da Galileia. Jesus não queria que ninguém o soubesse, porque ensinava os discípulos, dizendo-lhes: O Filho do homem vai ser entregue às mãos dos homens, que vão mata-lo; mas ele, três dias depois de morto, ressuscitará. Os discípulos não compreendiam aquelas palavras e tinham medo de o interrogar. Quando chegaram a Cafarnaum e já estava em casa, Jesus perguntoulhes: Que discutíeis no caminho? Eles ficaram calados, porque tinham discutido uns com os outro sobre qual deles era o maior. Então Jesus sentou-se, chamou os Doze e disse-lhes: Quem quiser ser o primeiro será o último de todo e o servo de todos. E, tomando uma criança, colocou-a no meio deles, abraçou-a e disse-lhes: Quem receber uma destas crianças em meu nome é a mim que recebe; e quem me receber não recebe a mim, mas Aquele que me enviou.



No domingo passado, vimos que, ao contrário da multidão, que via em Jesus só um grande personagem, os apóstolos, a uma certa altura, reconheceram nele o Filho de Deus. Na profissão de fé de Pedro se escondia um perigoso equívoco: a expectativa dum Messias glorioso e vencedor. Jesus estava a caminho de Jerusalém, não para ir conquistar um reino deste mundo, mas para doar a

sua própria vida. Os discípulos não entendem essas palavras. O tipo de Messias anunciado por Jesus é estranho demais para a sua mentalidade. Os apóstolos não compreenderam e não querem compreender as palavras do Mestre e continuam a preocupar-se com os as posições de poder que eles teriam quando Jesus inaugurasse o seu Reino. O desejo de ser o mais importante, de ser o primeiro, está na raiz do egoísmo humano. O grande tema do Evangelho – os últimos serão os primeiros e os primeiros serão os últimos - é o novo critério que Jesus estabelece para os seus discípulos. Jesus completa a instrução aos discípulos com um gesto... Toma uma criança, coloca-a no meio do grupo, abraça-a e convida os discípulos a acolherem as "crianças" que são o símbolo das pessoas fracas, desamparadas, sem nenhum poder.



A primeira leitura deste domingo diz-nos que os que optam por seguir a sabedoria de Deus irão ao encontro da perseguição, porque incomodam, perturbam os que continuam a construir a própria vida segundo a lógica da competição, do domínio, da exploração dos mais fracos.
